SUBJECT: Expanded Electronic Filing in Civil Cases

This Court has accommodated electronic filing for civil Statements of Claim and Dispossessory actions for several years. <u>Effective immediately</u>, electronic filing is extended to all types of civil cases, including, but not limited to:

- Statements of claim
- Dispossessory actions
- Personal Property Foreclosures
- Abandoned Vehicle actions
- Abandoned Mobile Home actions
- Abandoned Vessel actions
- Garnishments
- All other civil cases.

The electronic filing portal can be accessed from the court's Internet site: <u>www.cherokeega.com/Magistrate-court/</u>. Click on the "E-filing" link.

Electronic filing requirements are found at <u>Uniform Magistrate Court Rule 19</u>, <u>O.C.G.A.</u> <u>§ 10-12-11</u>, "Satisfaction of notarization, acknowledgment, verification or oath requirement;" <u>O.C.G.A. § 15-10-53</u>, "Filing documents by electronic means;" and <u>O.C.G.A. § 15-10-54</u>, "Use of personally identifiable data in court documentation; redaction."

Any document required to be submitted under oath, such as a verified statement of claim, can be verified by one of the methods shown in O.C.G.A. § 15-10-53(d).

## Advantages of Electronic Filing

Documents can be filed remotely as a way to help with "social distancing" during flu and virus epidemics.

E-filing can help conduct court business without missing work or other important activities.

Documents e-filed outside of normal business hours will be date- and time-stamped as of the moment they are filed, even if the Clerk processes the filing days later.

If e-filed documents meet the signature and verification requirements referenced above, a notary public is not required.
