DAILY UPDATE

- Cherokee County EMA and Board of Commissioners ask that you be mindful of your needed travels, contact with others, continue to practice social distancing, and practice good hygiene.
- Governor Kemp will hold a COVID-19 update this afternoon, Monday, April 13 at 4:00PM. The briefing will be live streamed at [facebook.com/GovKemp](https://www.facebook.com/GovKemp) or [gpb.org/coronavirus](https://www.gpb.org/coronavirus). It also likely will be shown on local television stations.
- The Georgia Department of Public Health has announced 13,315 confirmed cases of COVID-19 across the state.
- 464 deaths have occurred in the state as a result of COVID-19.
- Cherokee County has 198 confirmed cases of COVID-19.
- Cherokee County has seven (7) confirmed fatalities due to COVID-19.
- Governor Kemp has closed schools within the State for the remainder of the Spring Semester.
- Governor Kemp has signed a Shelter in Place Executive Order. This Order has been extended through 11:59 p.m. on Thursday, April, 30, 2020. Governor Kemp has also extended the Public Health State of Emergency through May 13, 2020. Please consult Order 04.08.20.02 at the link below for additional information and guidance.

- Cherokee County Administrative building at the Bluffs will remain closed to the public through April 30.
- The Cherokee County Senior Center will remain closed until April 30. Meals on Wheels and Homemaker services will continue.
- Cherokee Recreation and Parks Agency (CRPA) activities shall remain suspended until April 30.
- Cherokee Recreation and Parks Agency (CRPA) has announced the closing of all CRPA operated Playgrounds, Athletic Fields and Courts, Pavilions and the Skate Park. Walking and Hiking Trails will remain open.
- The Georgia Department of Public Health has established an Emotional Support Line. They will provide 24/7 free and confidential assistance to callers needing emotional support or resource information as a result of COVID-19. The number is 866-399-8938.
- District 1-2 Public Health is conducting drive through specimen sample collections to test for COVID-19 cases at the Woodstock Public Health Office. Symptomatic individuals eligible for testing are listed below:
 - Healthcare workers, first responders, and other critical infrastructure workers;
 - Persons residing in long-term care facilities or other group residential settings;
 - Persons 65 years of age and older;
 - Patients with underlying medical conditions;
 - Household members or care givers of any of the groups above;
 - Persons with close contact with a known COVID-19 case;
 - The following people without symptoms will also be tested as capacity allows:
 - Healthcare workers, first responders, and other critical infrastructure workers that have been exposed to COVID-19;
 - Residents of a long-term care facility or other group residential setting experiencing an outbreak of COVID-19.
- The Georgia Department of Public Health has established a COVID-19 hotline, if you have any general questions. This hotline will also answer testing specific questions. The hotline number is 844-442-2681.
- Two Long-term Care Facilities in Cherokee County have received assistance from the Georgia National Guard to disinfect their buildings due to COVID-19. This is a service that the National Guard is now offering to these types of facilities.

- The Cherokee County School District will continue to distribute to-go bags of food to students in need every Monday until further notice. A child, infant to age 18, must be present for a bag to be provided. These bags will contain a week of breakfasts and lunches for a child. Please visit the CCSD website for locations where to-go bags will be distributed.

- There are more than 20 vaccines currently in development. One of these vaccines has recently went into human trials. Realistically, a vaccine will require approximately a year of trials and testing before it could be available to the public.
- Until a vaccine is ready, several experimental treatments are underway. Anecdotal evidence suggest that these treatments could be effective against COVID-19. The FDA is in the process of approving other drugs to use in the treatment of COVID-19.

- Must Ministries in Canton is a drop off location for canned food items 7 days a week/8:00 AM-4:00 PM.
- Local parks and trails remain open to the general public. Please utilize the following guidelines for park use.
 - Follow CDC's guidance on personal hygiene prior to heading to parks and trails — wash hands, carry hand sanitizer, do not use parks or trails if you have symptoms, cover your mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing, etc.
 - Observe at all times CDC's minimum recommended social distancing of six feet from other people. Practice it and know what it looks like. Keep it as you walk, bike or hike.
 - Warn other trail users of your presence and as you pass to allow proper distance and step off trails to allow others to pass, keeping minimum recommended distances at all times. Signal your presence with your voice, bell or horn.
 - Note that trail and park users may find public restrooms closed — be prepared before you leave and time outings so that you are not dependent on public restrooms.
 - Bring water or drinks — public drinking fountains may be disabled and should not be used, even if operable
 - Bring a suitable trash bag. Leave no trash, take everything out to protect park workers

The citizens of Cherokee County are resilient and have always stepped up to meet any challenge. We are all in this together!

PREVENTATIVE MEASURES
