**DAILY UPDATE**

- Cherokee County EMA and Board of Commissioners ask that you be mindful of your needed travels, contact with others, continue to practice social distancing, and practice good hygiene.
- The Georgia Department of Public Health has announced 29,103 confirmed cases of COVID-19 across the state.
- 1,204 deaths have occurred in the state as a result of COVID-19.
- Cherokee County has 499 confirmed cases of COVID-19.
- Cherokee County has thirteen (13) confirmed fatalities due to COVID-19.
- The City of Holly Springs will re-open city hall to the public on Monday, May 4<sup>th</sup>. City playgrounds and pavilions will re-open on Thursday, May 14<sup>th</sup>. All public meetings will be conducted in-person, beginning in June. The Holly Springs Municipal Court will resume on Tuesday, May 26<sup>th</sup>, using social distancing protocols.
- The City of Woodstock has announced several updates. The City Hall Annex will open to the public on May 14<sup>th</sup>. City playgrounds, parks, and the William G. Long Senior Center will remain closed until May 13<sup>th</sup>. May court dates have been rescheduled to June.
- Governor Kemp has closed schools within the State for the remainder of the Spring Semester.
- Governor Kemp has signed an Executive Order Providing Flexibility for Healthcare Practices, Moving Certain Businesses to Minimum Operations, & Providing for Emergency Response. Please consult Order 04.20.20.01 at the link below for additional information and guidance.
- Governor Kemp signed an Executive Order to extend the Public Health State of Emergency until 11:59 p.m. on June 12, 2020. Please consult Order 04.30.20.01 for additional guidance.

- The Cherokee Family Violence 24/7 Hotline number is 770-479-1703 for English and 770-720-7050 for Spanish. The Cherokee Family Violence Center is providing emergency shelter for victims of domestic violence and assisting with emergency protection orders M-F 9am-5pm.
- The Georgia Department of Veteran's Service staff will be in the office on May 4, 2020. However, they will remain closed to foot traffic.
- Cherokee County Administrative building at the Bluffs will open to the general public on May 4, 2020.
- The Cherokee County Senior Center will remain closed until further notice. Meals on Wheels and Homemaker services will continue.
- The recycling center at Hobgood Park is open on a limited schedule for recycling only. Tuesday and Thursday from 9am-5pm and Saturday from 8am-4pm. Goodwill is currently not accepting donations at Hobgood Park. The recycling center at Blaylock remains open on their normal schedule.
- Cherokee Recreation and Parks Agency (CRPA) facilities, courts, Recreation Center, Aquatic Center, Union Hill Community Center, and outdoor rinks will open on Friday, May 1, 2020. Social distancing guidelines will still apply. Playgrounds, pavilions and the Skate Park will remain closed. All CRPA scheduled activities and programs will be canceled through May 1, 2020.
- CATS is resuming on-demand services on Tuesdays and Thursday for grocery store and pharmaceutical trips. Clients should call CATS to schedule those trips. Social distancing requirements and sanitation protocols on all buses will continue. Service to the Senior Center, Empower Cherokee and other high risk facilities will remain closed until further notice.
- The Courts of the Blue Ridge Judicial Circuit and Cherokee County will continue to operate

under the Judicial Emergency Order governing operations of the Courts of this State. The Courts will remain open to address essential functions as provided under the Judicial Emergency Order.

- The following facilities will remain closed to the general public until further notice:
  - Cherokee County Tax Commissioner's Office (the Canton and Woodstock location)
  - Cherokee County Tax Assessor's Office
  - Cherokee County Conference Center
  - Public Safety Complex
- The Georgia Department of Public Health has established an Emotional Support Line. They will provide 24/7 free and confidential assistance to callers needing emotional support or resource information as a result of COVID-19. The number is 866-399-8938.
- District 1-2 Public Health is conducting drive through specimen sample collections to test for COVID-19 cases at the Woodstock Public Health Office.
  - ALL symptomatic individuals are eligible for testing. You must go through your healthcare provider or local Health Department for a referral number.
    - The following people without symptoms will also be tested:
      - Healthcare workers and first responders.
      - The Georgia Department of Public Health has established a COVID-19 hotline, if you have any general questions. This hotline will also answer testing specific questions. The hotline number is 844-442-2681.
- The Georgia National Guard has set up four COVID-19 testing sites across metro Atlanta located at Greenbrier Mall, Kennesaw State University, Georgia State University Stadium (Turner Field), and the Decatur Armory.
  - Testing is free but registration is required
  - Citizens may register through the Augusta University Virtual Screening App <https://www.augustahealth.org/expresscare/covid-19-virtual-screening>
  - Citizens who do not have a smart phone may call (706) 721-1852 to register.
- Two Long-term Care Facilities in Cherokee County have received assistance from the Georgia National Guard to disinfect their buildings due to COVID-19. This is a service that the National Guard is now offering to these types of facilities.
- The Cherokee County School District will continue to distribute to-go bags of food to students in need every Monday until further notice. A child, infant to age 18, must be present for a bag to be provided. These bags will contain a week of breakfasts and lunches for a child. Please visit the CCSD website for locations where to-go bags will be distributed.

- There are more than 20 vaccines currently in development. One of these vaccines has recently went into human trials. Realistically, a vaccine will require approximately a year of trials and testing before it could be available to the public.
- Until a vaccine is ready, several experimental treatments are underway. Anecdotal evidence suggest that these treatments could be effective against COVID-19. The FDA is in the process of approving other drugs to use in the treatment of COVID-19.

- Must Ministries in Canton is a drop off location for canned food items 7 days a week/8:00 AM-4:00 PM.
- Local parks and trails remain open to the general public. Please utilize the following guidelines for park use.
  - Follow CDC's guidance on personal hygiene prior to heading to parks and trails — wash hands, carry hand sanitizer, do not use parks or trails if you have symptoms, cover your mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing, etc.
  - Observe at all times CDC's minimum recommended social distancing of six feet

from other people. Practice it and know what it looks like. Keep it as you walk, bike or hike.

- Warn other trail users of your presence and as you pass to allow proper distance and step off trails to allow others to pass, keeping minimum recommended distances at all times. Signal your presence with your voice, bell or horn.
- Note that trail and park users may find public restrooms closed — be prepared before you leave and time outings so that you are not dependent on public restrooms.
- Bring water or drinks — public drinking fountains may be disabled and should not be used, even if operable
- Bring a suitable trash bag. Leave no trash, take everything out to protect park workers

The citizens of Cherokee County are resilient and have always stepped up to meet any challenge. We are all in this together!

### **PREVENTATIVE MEASURES**
